THE ZOO IN 2023 OUR LEADERS

PRESIDENT: GRAHAM BARR

What a year! The end of my term as President coincides with the birth of my third child and as I am taking a few days to enjoy the addition to my family I am also reflecting on how important the Edmonton Valley Zoo is to our community and all families. The opportunity for children to learn about the animals we share this planet with and to interact with their families or their schools is essential to them growing up to be happy individuals and productive members of their community. More and more in this world we are learning that we cannot separate ourselves and our futures from the fate of the planet and Zoo's are leading the way in trying to instill hope and positive change in their communities. I am proud of our efforts this year which included starting construction on a new habitat for the wolves, raising money for conservation initiatives and field trips for Edmonton and area students, but perhaps our most important step this year was the commitment to funding the Masterplan with the Edmonton Valley Zoo. This commitment to shaping a vision for the Zoo's next 15 years and the future of our partnership with the Edmonton Valley Zoo is a testament to the passion of our board - and a gift to the City of Edmonton. We know you our donors are as proud of this facility as we are, and we cannot thank you enough for your support of all our projects, we hope we've done you proud and we cannot wait to share with you the completion of this year's work.

CITY LIAISON: GARY DEWAR

Where to start? Thanks to a generous contribution from the Society, a team of consultants were engaged to create a new Master Plan to ensure the zoo keeps pace with evolving industry best practices for the well-being of the zoo for the next 15 years.

A \$35.9M capital project has been undertaken by the zoo team to rehabilitate aging infrastructure and enhance animal enclosures. Two Arctic Wolves were relocated from France to be companions for our lone wolf Tundra. They will enjoy a beautiful new enclosure being funded and project managed by the Society. Our meerkat and python enclosures were enhanced, while many other animals in the zoo's care enjoyed additional enrichments thanks to the Society's support.

Prairie Can Federal Tourism funding resulted in \$1M investment in zoo facilities (new washrooms & an ecokiosk), effective marketing campaigns and a revitalized Zoom-inescence. Satisfaction with food and beverage services at the Zoo has grown dramatically in large part to the Society taking on operation of the Charity Cafe.

Our zoo received national recognition winning Canada's Accredited Zoos and Aquarium Awards of Excellence for our Northern Leopard Frog Conservation success, the Society's Conservation Carousel, and the innovative Pay It Forward for the Planet field trip subsidy program. A newly introduced Conservation Membership Category and Quarters for Conservation admission revenue share program enabled donations to worthy conservation organizations.

We welcomed over 340,000 visitors including 38,000 program participants in 2023 and are on track to surpass this in 2024. The Society continues to play a catalyst role in the transformation of the EVZ.

MANDATE IN ACTION CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT

ARCTIC WOLF HABITAT

The VZDS and Malliner Charitable Foundation embarked on a transformative project: the creation of a new habitat for Tundra, the Arctic wolf, and the new packmates that joined him in February 2024. By creating an enriching and stimulating environment that aligns with wolves instincts and behaviors and focuses on cognitive challenges, play, and natural expression, the VZDS aims to provide an upgrade to our Arctic wolves while promoting awareness about their conservation needs. Construction of the new habitat began in 2023. The anticipated completion date set for the summer of 2024.

CONSERVATION CAROUSEL OPERATIONS

During the first six months of operation, 21,000 people rode the newly refurbished Conservation Carousel! A ride on the Conservation Carousel is by donation, raising funds for future conservation projects while educating children about the incredible animals they're enjoying and surrounded by at the zoo. 2023 Carousel donations totaled \$7,954.00.

NORTHERN LEOPARD FROG PROJECT

In October of 2019, 22 juvenile endangered Rocky Mountain Northern Leopard Frog frogs arrived at the Edmonton Valley Zoo. The goal of the Northern Leopard Frog Project was the breeding of captive individuals to produce healthy tadpoles for release.

We are thrilled to report that in June of 2023, two EVZ zookeepers journeyed to a protected wetlands area in British Columbia where they released 277 zoo-born and raised Northern Leopard Frogs.

WASHROOM & ECO KIOSK

The mobile accessible gender-neutral washrooms and eco-kiosk constructed with a grant from the Federal Tourism Relief Fund we secured in 2022 were completed and fully operational during the 2023 season.

CONSERVATION

In 2023, we supported the conservation efforts of the International Elephant Foundation, Polar Bears International, Red Panda Network, Grevy Zebra Trust, Snow Leopard Trust, and the Lemur Foundation.

During the summer of 2024, we will promote conservation and learning through play with the World Premier of the Little Ray's Wildlife Rescue Exhibition, featuring 12 climbable animal statues.

VIRTUAL VIDEOS SERIES

In collaboration with the Edmonton Valley Zoo, we created seven NEW! virtual learning opportunities that allow educators and students to join our animal care and education team for an opportunity to Get Closer to our animals from the comfort of their learning spaces. Tailored to meet the Alberta curriculum and its applicable age groups, but flexible for any viewer, these interactive programs highlight some species not always seen during on-site programs and often exhibit behind-the-scenes highlights. After the video concludes, classes are welcomed to join a member of the zoo education team for an interactive O&A session.

PAY IT FORWARD TO THE PLANET

In its first full year of operation Pay It Forward sent 660 students to the Edmonton Valley Zoo. With an age range of 2-16, we enabled students of all ages and backgrounds to engage in hands-on learning, both in and out of the classroom. These projects didn't only reach the students and teachers, but also their friends, families, and communities.

With the generous help of several donors, we funded a total of 31 classes and 28 conservation projects. These projects included schoolyard and community clean-ups, the construction and installation of bat boxes, gardening initiatives, and more. Thirteen talented performers took to the Amphitheatre stage, including Marianna Henriques, Jon Martin & Lovers, Jungle Monkey, and Shiny Big Tunes. Unique animal encounters were enjoyed by all. Free bus service to an after-party at The Pint kept the fun going all night.

Presented by The King's University, the eleventh annual Zoominescence: A Festival of Light, was our biggest winter festival yet! Just under 30,000 guests attended in 2023, nearly doubling our 2022 attendance. The 2023 theme was "Northern Animal Conservation." The Zoo was illuminated with over 50 light installations, including 5 conservation-themed art installations by local artists Trew Facks & GABS, Retro Active Arcade Ltd., Ace Wood Co., We-Met Wire Work and Sokaris Inc. Live entertainment included 12 character performers and much, much more!

Going into our twelfth year, our 2024 theme is "Animal Conservation Success Stories." We're excited to bring even more creative animal light displays to our Zoo for all to enjoy this winter!


