PRESIDENT: LEIGH WILSON

What a year! I welcomed my first child at the beginning of my term, which allowed me to see the zoo in a new light—not only in terms of its impact on key species and their conservation, but also in how it brings people and families together in a new and exciting way.

This year, we had the opportunity to plan what the zoo is to become over the next 5-15 years, through our Master Planning process with the City. This is an extensive process that involves countless stakeholders, and we are thrilled to have great partners who will help bring our vision to life!

We took on several major projects at the zoo: we revamped the sloth habitat; completed and opened the new R. Mollot Arctic wolf habitat for Tundra, and his new packmates Aspen and Anuri; and committed to the Aspen Reforestation Project, which will bring ~9,000m² of aspen grasses and trees. These projects are a testament to our commitment to the unique species at the zoo, how we can educate differently, and how everyone is a part of conservation.

The VZDS also grew itself! We have historically been a small team, and with taking a more active approach in our fundraising, project development, and future planning, we have decided to bring on fund development and project management expertise as we grow our team and the Society's operating portfolio. As I reflect on the past year and the future of the VZDS, I feel immense pride and incredible excitement for what's to come!

THE ZOO IN 2024 OUR LEADERS

CITY LIAISON: GARY DEWAR Director, Edmonton Valley Zoo

The quaint, storybook-inspired Zoo that opened in 1959, continues to undergo a dramatic transformation to an accredited, progressive zoological institution with an increasing focus on conservation, education, research, animal well-being, species survival and preserving biodiversity.

With most of the ambitious 2005 Master Plan complete including Makira Outpost, Arctic Shores, Entry Plaza and Wander, and Nature's Wild Back Yard, a bold new chapter begins with an inspiring new 15 year Master Plan that was generously sponsored by VZDS. The roadmap reinforces our Vision for a sustainable world where all living things thrive and realizes our Mission to leverage our unique role to connect people with animals, care about wildlife and conserve the natural world.

Thanks to the Society, we opened the exciting new R. Mollot Arctic Wolf Habitat and treated our Sloths to a beautifully transformed jungle inspired space. A creative new funding and construction model between the City and VZDS will serve as a catalyst for future enhancements including the modernization of the Carnivores Habitat.

EVZ continues to enjoy growth in attendance exceeding pre-COVID levels. Despite a smokey summer and some bitterly cold December evenings, participation has grown 11% since 2022. We welcomed over 340,000 visitors including 38,000 program participants in 2024. The VZDS has and continues to play a catalyst role in the transformation of EVZ.

ARCTIC WOLF HABITAT

We celebrated the completion of the R. Mollot Arctic Wolf Habitat at the Edmonton Valley Zoo-a major step forward in the zoo's revitalization. Designed to encourage natural behaviours and provide more space to roam, the habitat now houses Arctic wolves Aspen, Anuri, and Tundra. With all three wolves moved in, careful introductions are now underway. This thoughtfully designed space not only improves the daily lives of the animals but also helps guests connect more meaningfully with this iconic northern species and the conservation challenges they face.

MASTERPLAN

The Valley Zoo Development Society proudly funded the development of the Edmonton Valley Zoo's new Master Plan—a visionary roadmap that will guide the zoo's future growth, revitalization, and conservation impact. The plan outlines exciting opportunities to enhance animal habitats, visitor experiences, environmental and sustainability across the site. While details remain under wraps for now, the Master Plan will be officially revealed to the public in 2025, and we can't wait to share what's next for the zoo we all love.



SLOTH HABITAT UPGRADE

We celebrated the completion of a beautiful new sloth habitat-an inspiring labour of love built by the zoo's dedicated animal care team. Created in partnership with Salisbury Greenhouse, this lush, custom-designed space provides a warm and enriching environment for the zoo's sloths to explore, climb, and thrive. Every detail of the habitat was thoughtfully crafted to meet the animals' needs, resulting in a vibrant indoor rainforest experience that brings quests closer to one of the zoo's most beloved species.

AOUARIUM WRAPS

We added four bright, engaging wraps to the reptile enclosures in the Saito Centre. These new visuals enhance the space with naturalistic backdrops, helping guests connect more closely with some of the zoo's reptile residents.


CONSERVATION

In 2024, the Valley Zoo Development Society proudly supported over \$25,000 in donations to in-situ conservation efforts, benefiting organizations such as the Lemur Conservation Foundation, the Red Panda Network, the Wildlife Conservation Society (Amur Tiger Fund), Polar Bears International, Grevy's Zebra Trust, the International Elephant Foundation, and the Snow Leopard Trust.

The Edmonton Valley Zoo also had another successful year with its Northern Leopard Frog breeding program, contributing to the recovery of this endangered species. We also launched the *Spilling the Beans* monthly coffee chats, offering insightful discussions on pressing conservation topics, further strengthening our commitment to wildlife preservation and education.

VIRTUAL VIDEOS SERIES

This year, we expanded our virtual education series with eight new videos that bring animals and conservation to life. Designed to align with the Alberta curriculum, this growing series continues to inspire curiosity, support classroom learning, and connect students with the vital work happening at the zoo every day.

PAY IT FORWARD FOR THE PLANET

The end of 2024 marks the second full year of Pay it Forward. We've helped connect over 1529 students to classroom conservation and hands-on learning, and provided them with memorable curriculum relevant education on-site at the Edmonton Valley Zoo.

Thanks to generous donor support, over 96 classes have completed conservation projects they would not have otherwise attempted. Turning students into environmental stewards and conservationists, and seeing the real-world impact of their projects.

From projects that engage entire schools in month-long animal advocacy initiatives, to protecting River Valley trails from litter and learning about the animals who call it home, Pay it Forward has moved beyond schools and has begun engaging entire communities.


